

Bill's high school experiences and his exceptional musical skills put him way ahead of most Navy musicians. He floated to the top of the class and stayed there throughout his high school, and again in his Navy career and later in his civilian life and career. The Navy broadcast news and entertainment for the military stationed throughout the Pacific and at sea. Bill was a star singer and trumpet player for four years of those broadcasts during the war. Some recordings still exist and they are exciting and fun to listen to. His voice was golden and so was his trumpet.




Bill Harten on cornet is second from left in band column 3/4 of the way back.
